WATTS UPDATE

Thank you! Thank you! Thank you to all who helped, donated, and prayed for WATTS February 21 to 28. God was looking out for us. Whenever I needed something, someone would call and volunteer to help. There were 22 guests the first night with no women. There were about 25 men and three women the second night. On Wednesday there were two women with a total of 29 guests. On Thursday there were 31 guests including 2 women. On Friday there were 26 men and 2 women. On Saturday there were 26 including 1 woman. On Sunday there were 26 including 2 women. I want to particularly thank those who volunteered to stay overnight—Dave and Sandy Sobczynski, Bob McDonald-Walker, Judy Hagan, Gary Peer, Janet Keithley, Todd Bowman, Cheryl Gracey, Jill Pangle, John Spencer, Missy and Tom Jackson, and Denise and Dugan Hahn. In addition to the paid night managers who stayed awake all night, two nurses volunteered their time each evening to help guests with medical problems.

I want to thank groups in the church who helped. Thank the Mary Martha, The Susannah Wesley, and the FULL Circles. Also thank the Pink Streeters Relay for Life Team for providing snacks for the week.

In addition to the wonderful volunteers from our church which are too numerous to mention, members from other area churches pitched in to help. Members from John Mann helped to unload and load cots, helped with greeting, and provided food for breakfast and dessert. Our neighbors from Centenary Reformed Church provided lunches for two days and engaged the Gainesboro Ruritan to provide breakfast. Members of the Baha'is helped with registration and greeting one evening. Grace United Methodist Church helped with dinner two nights. Duncan Memorial United Methodist Church in Berryville and Brucetown United Methodist Church also provided dinner one night. Shenandoah University provided music, dinner and a Bible study on Sunday evening. We appreciate all of them.

There were about 170 volunteers (some were there more than once) who worked about 500 hours. There were an average of 2 women and 26 men each night. One of the volunteers said that it changed her life. It made her more appreciative of what she had. One volunteer said that she was surprised that there were so many young men. Another said it “put a face on the homeless.” One of the guests thanked me for being nice to him. Quite a few others thanked us as well. We were pleased to have one guest come to church.

A couple of the guests were artists. Thank you to the United Methodist Women giving a gift to mission and to Market Street for purchasing one of the pictures to hang in the church in my honor. We are also giving a donation to WATTS with money that you contributed. To God be the glory!

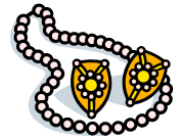
Our Relay event is June 17th and 18th at James Wood High School.

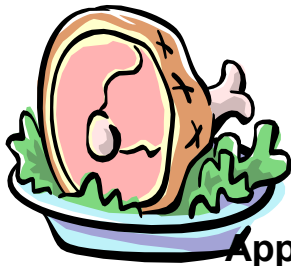

From Your Parish Nurse - Let's Talk about Shingles

Symptoms: Shingles is a virus that may cause pain, burning, or a tingling feeling on either side of the body or face. Other symptoms may include chills, fever, headache or an upset stomach. In days or weeks later, a small band or rash appears in the same spot. There will be a deep burning, aching or a stabbing pain that may last for a short period of time or may last a long time. The rash develops into fluid-filled blisters. A person with shingles can spread the virus until the blisters become scabs.

Risks for developing Shingles: A history of having chickenpox; being female & over 50; having a weakened immune system (diabetes or HIV); experiencing stress or trauma; having cancer or receiving cancer therapy.

Prevention: A vaccine know as Zostavax is available with a prescription. One dose is recommended for adults 60 years or older. The vaccine can help prevent shingles or make shingles less painful/ Talk to your health care provider for more information

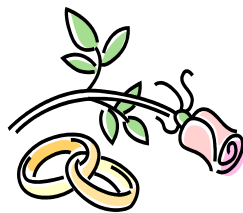

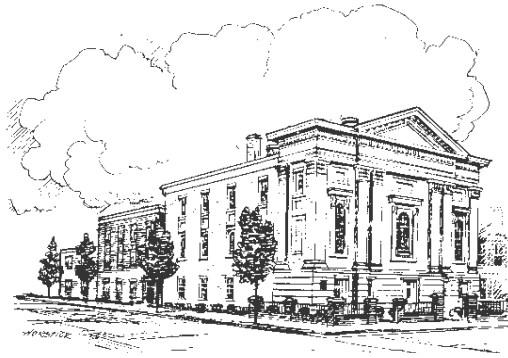
